



ANSTSE Core Elements of Driver Education Parent/Guardian Seminars


- ANSTSE identified the need to:

Section 5: Parent/Guardian Involvement

Standard 5.2.1

 States shall require the parent/guardian of a novice teen driver to complete a parent/guardian seminar.

Section 5: Parent/Guardian Involvement

Standard 5.2.2

 States shall ensure that the content in parent/guardian seminars describes their responsibilities and opportunities to manage the novice teen driver's overall learning to drive experience to reduce the novice teen's risk.



Parent/Guardian Involvement

- Plays a vital role in supporting and enhancing driver education during the novice teen's learning-to-drive experience.
- Plays an important role in reducing teen crashes and fatalities.
- Vital to the State's GDL program.
- Must be coordinated between the State agencies responsible for driver education and licensing.

Parent/Guardian Involvement

- Responsible for providing the novice teen's supervised driving practice.
- Regulate their driving exposure.
- Vital to influence safe driving habits to reduce crashes.

Prepare

Prepare parents/guardians for their critical role during their teen's learning-to-drive process.



Provide

Provide a foundation for the prevention of novice driver motor vehicle crashes.



Ease

toward the implementation of such Seminars.



Advocate

Advocate to all stakeholders the benefits of Seminars.

Provide awareness of the tools and resources to properly educate parents/guardians to become driving coaches for novice teen drivers.

Benefits of Parent/Guardian Seminars

- Helps ease the parent/ guardian into the teen's learning-to-drive experience.
- Shows parents/guardians how to conduct effective risk-management.
- Describes restrictions that can be placed on the teen.
- Provides parents/guardians with ideas and resources when driving with their teen.





Why Use the Core Elements?

- Deliver and enhance the content of Seminars.
- Engage parents/guardians during their novice teen's learning-to-drive experience.
- Require parent/guardian participation in the Seminar and the means to participate in the learning-to-drive process.
- Utilize Seminar materials and make accessible to all providers.





Why Use the Core Elements?


- Enable parents/guardians to be active during the learning-todrive experience.
- Implement a plan to evaluate the Seminar.
- Establish a process to continuously review and update the Seminar.





Core Elements for a Driver Education Parent/Guardian Seminar

- Provides core elements for three key areas of seminars:
 - Administrative
 - Content
 - Delivery

- Modeling safe driving behavior
 - Obey traffic laws
- Determining the readiness of the teen to begin the learning process







- Managing the novice driver's overall learning-to-drive experience
 - State licensing procedures
 - State's GDL laws, parent/guardian enforcement
 - Novice driver's and parent/guardian expectations and responsibilities
 - Managing all phases of driving privileges
 - Major risk factors for teen driving crashes







Content Elements - Major Risk Factors

- Inexperience
- Impairment
- Distractions
- Speeding
- Occupant protection
- Passengers
- Nighttime driving
- Risky drive routes
- Other current causation factors









- Conducting effective supervised practice driving
 - Importance of the driving log
 - Difference between driving today vs. when the parent/guardian learned
 - Techniques we teach and why
 - Fears of teaching a novice teen driver
 - Typical behaviors of a novice teen driver
 - Select the primary coach in the family
 - Tips and guidelines to coach the driver





- Share instruction, directions and terminology used in the course
- Explain commentary driving
- Practice effective communication using constructive criticism and positive reinforcement
- Review times and environments to drive
- How to set goals and evaluate teen's progress
- Share driving knowledge using good communication skills





 Determining the teen's readiness to advance to the next licensing stage and assume broader driving privileges





- Negotiating and adopting a written agreement between the teen and parent/guardian
 - Driving restrictions limit on nighttime driving, number of passengers
 - Privileges
 - Driving rules obeying laws, use and maintenance of car, grades in school
 - Consequences for breaking agreement
- Many models available online

Access to State licensing procedures

Access to rules, regulations, expectations of the GDL and

driver education requirements

- Resources on the risks of driving
- A parent/guardian guide
- Tool for logging practice
- Sample parent/guardian-teen agreement
- Choosing a safer vehicle

Delivery Elements

- Conducted by trained individuals who utilize adult learning theories
- Be engaging and informational
- Incorporate active learning and blended presentations
- Provide resources with key information
- Provide for participant needs (language, disability, culture)

Delivery Elements

- Include presentations on the risks of driving (e.g., trauma nurse, law enforcement) appealing to the parent/guardians' emotions
- Discuss how the parent/guardians' and teen's efforts can integrate with driver education and driver licensing process

Delivery Elements

- Increase opportunities for access
- Provide alternative ways for delivery
 - Face-to-face (preferred)
 - Online program (alternative)
 - One-on-one meeting (alternative)
 - Multiple offerings and times (evenings/weekends)

Delivery Elements and Increasing Access

- Many parents/guardians have difficulties in attending face-to-face seminars.
- Since the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic many people, including educators and parents/guardians have become accustomed to live-virtual settings.
- We have all learned much about facilitating in a virtual environment since the pandemic.
- The virtual setting has much promise in increasing access to seminars.




